## Complying with Land Use & Building Regulations

The City commonly finds itself responding to violations of various land use or building regulations. In many instances, it's simply that someone is unaware of the regulations, and of course there will always be those who do what they want regardless of what's allowed. Our hope is that most people will comply with the rules if they understand them. Given the City's limited enforcement resources, we ask everyone to self-monitor and do the right thing to ensure our community is one that we can all be proud of.

Following is a listing of the most common violations. In each newsletter hereafter we'll include a monthly feature highlighting one of these:

- Accumulation of garbage, rubbish, trash, or debris.
- Animal Feces.
- Encroachment of fences, bushes, tree limbs, or personal property on the sidewalk or street.
- Excessive growth of weeds, grass, or noxious vegetation.
- Illegal and unpermitted signs (e.g., banners, portable signs).
- Improper stacking or storage of materials.
- Inoperable or abandoned vehicles on private property.
- Over-height or illegally placed fences, walls or hedges.
- Parking of commercial vehicles on residential property.
- Poor maintenance of vacant homes.
- Storage of boats or vehicles in setbacks or front yards.
- Structural deterioration, rotten wood, peeling paint.
- Unclean and unsanitary conditions.

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## Watering Tips

During the warmer weather, typically 50% of the water we use is for watering lawns and plants. While some improvements require an investment, others are just a simple quick check of your system.

Adjust your sprinklers so that water lands on your lawn or garden where it belongs -- and only there. You can save 500 gallons a month. A drive through neighborhoods in the morning will show how many sprinklers are watering the streets.



Don't overwater. Too much water can harm plants – as much if not more – than inadequate water.

Don't water the lawn on windy days. Watering in windy conditions can waste up to 300 gallons in one watering.

Adjust or deactivate automatic sprinklers when it's raining. This could save up to 300 gallons each time.

Set lawn mower blades one notch higher. Longer grass means less evaporation. You can save 500 to 1,500 gallons each month.

Step on your grass. If it springs back when you lift your foot, it doesn't need water. Water your lawn only when it needs it. Set your sprinklers for more days in between watering. You can save 750 to 1,500 gallons a month.

Put a layer of mulch, peat moss, or gravel around trees and plants to slow down evaporation. You can save 750 to 1,500 gallons a month.

Consider replacing high-water-using trees and plants with native plants that require about two-thirds less water to thrive than non-native plants. Long term this can save you 750 to 1,500 gallons a month.

Upgrade to weather-smart irrigation controllers for your sprinkler system. They self-adjust the amount and timing of watering depending on the weather so you don't have to!

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
