The City of Eagle Point schedules sweeping of City streets on Thursdays. The downtown business area, including Main Street, is swept every week. Each street is swept on a rotating basis, with each street swept each month. Occasionally, due to an emergency water break, sweeping would occur on a Friday. In late summer and early fall, City crews prune the street trees for clearances as needed for school buses, garbage trucks and the street sweeper.

EAGLE POINT MUSEUM



The Eagle Point Museum has the second largest collection of artifacts in Jackson County. The museum was originally the Long Mountain School, built in 1925. About 20 years later it was moved to Eagle Point, where it remained a school and then part of School District 9. The community joined together and moved the museum to its current location, opening in 1978. Later Additions were made to the building in the 1990's. With changes in funding for the county historical societies, the Eagle point Historical Society asked the city to run the museum in 2008.

HARNISH WAYSIDE PARK



Eagle Point's information center, Harnish Wayside, located at the corner of Highway 62 and old Highway 62 is named for one of the long-time families in Eagle Point. The visitor's center is patterned after the livery stable known as the Harnish Livery Stable constructed in 1913. The Harnish Visitors Center sits on part of the 50-acres originally owned by the Harnish Family.

Interpretive Center

The Interpretive Center offers a historical mural view of the growth of Eagle Point and information rooms. An Area Attractions room provides directions and offers information about Eagle Point and the Upper Rogue portion of Jackson County.



Little Butte Creek Room

The Little Butte Creek room speaks to the importance of Little Butte Creek in the area ecosystem. From the natural riparian environment of the creek to the fish and animal life that call the creek home, Little Butte Creek is both a feature in the natural setting of Eagle Point and important to the region's natural environment. Portions of Little Butte Creek are also combined with other water from the Rogue River to be used as drinking water for thousands of residents in the region. .
