

Eagle Point Transit Update

The City Council is considering a measure to include transit service on an upcoming ballot for a vote of the community. Results of a City survey conducted at the end of 2013 indicated that a majority of the Eagle Point population believes transit service to be beneficial, and may be willing to pay some amount of additional property tax to help with the cost of extending RVTD bus service to our town within the next year or two. The City Council is considering placing this on a future ballot for citizen vote.

Complying with Land Use & Building Regulations

In September of last year, the City began a monthly series in this newsletter addressing land use and building compliance issues. This month we'll wrap up the series with a summary of the most common compliance issues, and say thank you to everyone out there taking the time and energy to do your part in keeping our community looking great.

Exterior Painting: All exterior surfaces and structures should be maintained in good condition. Exterior wood surfaces, other than decay-resistant woods, should be protected by painting or other protective covering or treatment. Peeling, flaking and chipped paint should be eliminated and surfaces repainted.



Accessory Structure in Disrepair: Structures that are accessory to a house (such as fences, sheds, and detached garages) should be maintained structurally and in good repair.



Outdoor Storage, Debris, Miscellaneous Refuse & Garbage: No outdoor storage of any material (usable or waste) is permitted in residential neighborhoods, except within enclosed containers. And rubbish, salvage materials, junk, and miscellaneous refuse should not be stored or kept in the open, nor have a negative influence on the neighborhood.

Tall Grasses & Weeds: All exterior areas of our property should be maintained free from weeds and high grasses.

Unlicensed/Inoperable Vehicle Parking and Storage of Boats, Campers, Trailers, and RV's: Outside storage of trailers, recreational vehicles, campers, boats, or related equipment should be kept on a paved surface in the rear yard, or side yard if adequate space and screening is provided. Inoperable or unlicensed motor vehicles should not be parked, kept or stored on any premises, and vehicles in a state of major disassembly, disrepair, or in the process of being stripped or dismantled should be kept out of view.



Old Fire Station Property

Look for a community workshop some time in May or June, as the City begins looking at potential future use of the old fire station property on Main Street, across the street from Bob Moore Park. The City has contracted with a local architect to assist with conceptual site planning for a variety of potential uses and new building configurations. Issues being looked at include the types of uses that would be suitable, building size and relationship to the street, design features, vehicular and pedestrian accessibility and circulation, and parking. The property is approximately one acre in size, with frontage on both Main Street and Loto Street, as well as the alley running down the middle. The City is looking to engage the community to help generate ideas for creating a viable development option that could be built and operated by a private interest and/or the City as future opportunity arises.
